Legislative Advocacy 101

- 1. Thank the legislator or staff member for their support of the Society and your local history affiliate for the 2021-2023 budget cycle.

 - ✓ WHS received \$8,321,000 of general fund supported borrowing to be matched with \$6,000,000 of gifts, grants, and other receipts for Old World Wisconsin
 - ✓ \$4,000,000 of building trust funds to assist with project planning, development, design, site selection, and land and property acquisition for the new museum.
 - Biennial Budget: Sustained WHS's operating budget requests
 - American Rescue Plan Act (ARPA) State Recovery Act Dollars:
 - ✓ WHS also received a million dollars from the ARPA State Recovery Act supported by the Governor and legislators for reopening and recovery costs of Museums and statewide Historic Sites.

2021-2023 Capital Budget Talking Points

History Museum Project:

Thank you and your colleagues for supporting the Wisconsin History Museum!!!!

• **2021-2023 Budget** included \$4,000,000 of building trust funds to assist with project planning, development, design, site selection, and land and property acquisition.

Details:

- As you know, a new museum will address critical problems with the current museum involving public safety, inadequate space for exhibits and visitors (sometimes forcing school groups to be turned away), failing technology and facility maintenance issues that will cost millions.
 This museum will serve as the central hub for statewide history and national education and outreach.
- The Wisconsin Historical Society has secured a site to build a 100,000 gross square foot museum that would allow WHS to expand its current footprint on the Capital Square in Madison.
- The museum project is estimated to cost \$120 million. The Wisconsin Historical Foundation has raised \$35 million for the construction and undertaken a campaign to raise \$20 million for programming. The state enumerated \$70 million for construction in the last biennial budget. The new museum project will allow the Wisconsin Historical Society to:
 - Accommodate twice as many students each school year.
 - Reach students and local history organizations in all 72 counties with distance learning technology.
 - o Enhance local history partnerships through changing galleries and traveling exhibits.
 - o Offer the much needed space to display the Society's largest artifacts.


Thank you and your colleagues for \$8,321,000 of general fund supported borrowing to be matched with \$6,000,000 of gifts, grants, and other receipts to complete the Old World Entrance masterplan. The project includes the following components:

• **2021 – 2023 Capital Budget** included \$8,321,000 of general fund supported borrowing to be matched with \$6,000,000 of gifts, grants, and other receipts for Old World Wisconsin

- The relocation and restoration of the Wittnebel Tavern. A gift funded component, the Tavern will augment the brewery and beer garden experience and enhance earned revenue and rental capacity on site.
- Infrastructure Improvements. Old World Wisconsin site infrastructure has been largely
 untouched since the site was developed in 1976. Critical issues related to water quality,
 sanitation, connectivity, and electricity must be addressed in order for the site to effectively
 operate into the 21st century.
- Renovation of existing structures. The iconic, signature, and historic Clausing and Ramsey Barns will be renovated and their use integrated into the re-envisioned guest experience.
- <u>Visitor Services.</u> A new ticketing and retail structure will bring add essential 21st century guest amenities while increasing revenue opportunities on site.

Details:

- In 2011, a tornado destroyed hundreds of trees at Old World Wisconsin, forever changing the guest entrance experience.
- In 2014, pre-planning efforts were initiated to reimagine the visitor experience with a goal to improve guest amenities, update failing infrastructure, and increase revenue generating functions.
- In 2017, \$1.65 million GIFTS was enumerated for the brewery experience at Old World Wisconsin, a component of the new guest experience plan.
- In 2019, the Society completed the A/E selection for the Brewery and completion of the OWW entrance experience master plan.
- In August 2020, the State Building Commission increased the budget and authorized construction of the Old World Brewery and Beer Garden project.
- In September, the Old World Entrance Experience masterplan was completed.
- In December 2020, the State Building Commission increased the Brewery and Beer Garden project again, due to identified infrastructure costs.

Due to the COVID-19 pandemic, in-person school visits and programming at the Society's 12 historic sites and museums were temporarily paused, with National History Day and some other programs pivoting to a virtual format. Most operations and outreach services are expected to return to normal service in 2022. 



IMPACT ON WISCONSIN

In 2021, the Wisconsin Historical Society made major contributions to Wisconsin's economic, educational, and cultural health through innovative initiatives and programs.

EDUCATION

- 6,698 K-12 students engaged at numerous historic sites and museums
- 3,562 students participated in virtual National History Day (NHD)
- 52 students qualified for the NHD national finals
- 40,918 books sold by the Society Press, many printed on Wisconsin paper
- 41,740 students used the Society's 4th-grade Wisconsin history textbook
- 445 attendees participated in the 2021 virtual local history conference
- 10,603 attendees participated in multiple Society presentations across the state
- 23,638 overall audience reached by traveling exhibits across 15 communities

PRIVATE INVESTMENT & JOBS

- 478 buildings rehabilitated using tax credit programs
- 2,209 jobs created by construction projects
- \$127 million income-producing historic rehabilitation work in Wisconsin
- \$24.6 million federal historic preservation tax credits awarded to the state
- \$143.4 million invested in rehabilitated historic properties

STATEWIDE IMPACT

- More than \$4 million of the Society's \$22.9 million budget over 18% was supported by gifts, grants, and earned income in Fiscal Year 2021
- 30,585 visitors at our 12 Wisconsin historic sites and museums
- 9,880 active members of the Wisconsin Historical Society

- A network of 422 affiliated local historical and community organizations advised and supported by the Society
- 13 new titles and 7 audiobooks published by the Society Press

Who We Are

The Wisconsin Historical Society is the state's memory and premier storyteller. Though we are a small state agency, we make major contributions to Wisconsin's economic, educational, and cultural health through innovative initiatives and programs.

Our Value

Our programs, historic sites, museums, collections, and archives inform and entertain while also challenging the public to think critically about their place in history. We promote Wisconsin tourism and our historic preservation program reinvigorates neighborhoods. We believe that increasing the public's knowledge of history has profound societal, cultural, and economic benefit.





Meeting the Moment, Preparing for the Future

- Collected history as it happened during the 2021 fiscal year, acquiring
 25 manuscript collections and 872 objects, as well as 140 submissions to our COVID-19 Journal Project (now over 400 total).
- 53 Society staff members shared their expertise by accepting temporary job reassignments to help other state agencies (DHS, DWD) respond to demand for services during the height of the pandemic.
- Surpassed our target of \$30 million raised in private contributions for a new state history museum and secured real estate for a final site on Capitol Square, keeping us on our timeline to open the museum in 2026.
- Reopened all 12 historic sites and museums across the state for in-person visits in summer 2021 thanks to \$1 million in Recovery Act funding.
- Reached \$2.6 million in private gifts, allowing Phase I of the New Arrivals entry project at Old World Wisconsin to move forward with the construction of a new brewing building and relocation of a 1906 tavern to the historic site.



Education

- Despite the pandemic, 3,526 students participated in the National History Day program, with 52 qualifying for the National competition and seven finishing in the Top 10 or winning special awards.
- The Society enjoyed significant growth in digital engagement. Total
 followers on social media platforms reached 47,632, including a 25%
 increase on Facebook. One post on the anniversary of the Peshtigo fire
 reached 151,452 people and was shared over 1,400 times.
- 41,740 students used our 4th-grade Wisconsin history textbook.
- The Society Press sold 40,918 books, many printed on Wisconsin paper, and published 13 new titles and 7 audiobooks.
- · Society Press virtual and in-person programs attracted 6,395 attendees.
- 382 people from 19 states and 53 Wisconsin counties participated in our 14th Annual Local History and Historic Preservation Conference, including 49% first-time attendees. The virtual event featured 32 sessions.



Statewide Impact

- Before fully reopening in-person, Society historic sites created new programs for safe engagement, such as the *Family Fun Drive* at Old World Wisconsin, which drew 4,000 drive-thru guests in fall 2020 and spring 2021.
- The Society ended the fiscal year with 9,880 members (2,289 new).
- Library & Archives Division provided access to historic books, newspapers, documents, and other materials to more than **19,238 patrons**.
- Advised and supported a network of 425 affiliated local history and community organizations.
- The 962-square-mile Wisconsin Shipwreck Coast in Lake Michigan, researched and mapped by Society archaeologists, was designated the 15th national marine sanctuary, paving the way for educational programming and economic impact for communities through tourism.



Private Investments and Jobs

- Over \$4 million of the Society's \$22.9 million budget more than 18% was supported by gifts, grants and earned income in Fiscal Year 2021.
- The State Historic Preservation Office approved projects that resulted in \$127 million in income-producing historic rehabilitation work in Wisconsin, bringing \$24.6 million in federal historic preservation tax credits to the state and creating 2,117 jobs. A total of 478 buildings were rehabilitated.
- The private sector invested \$143 million in rehabilitated historic properties with the help of Society historic preservation specialists.
