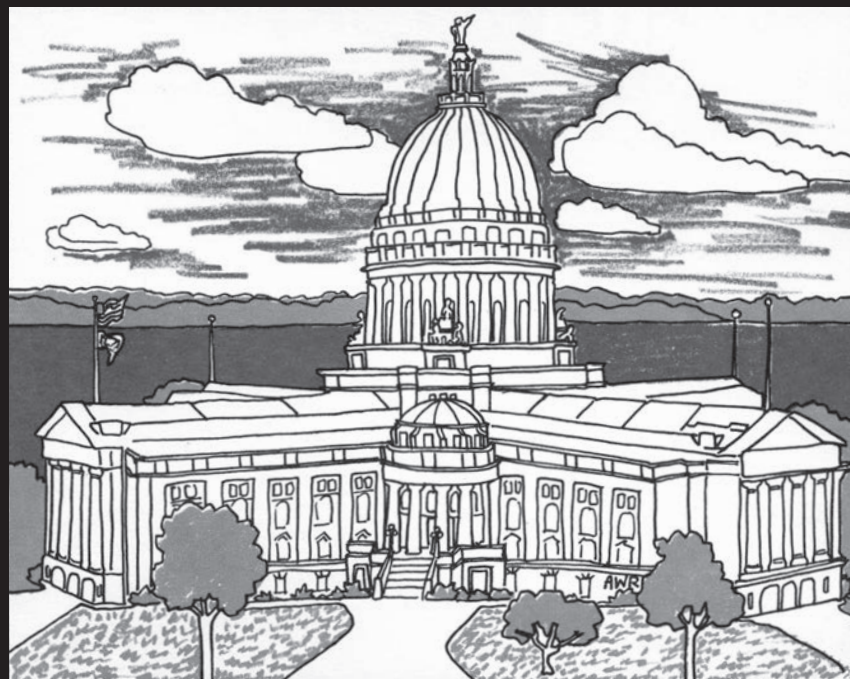

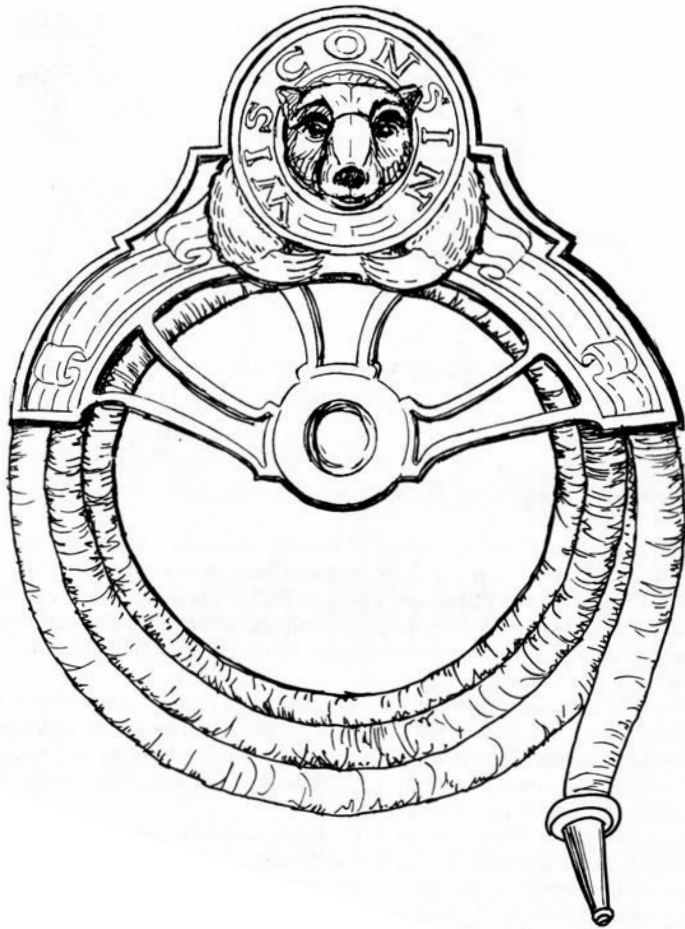

Wisconsin State Capitol

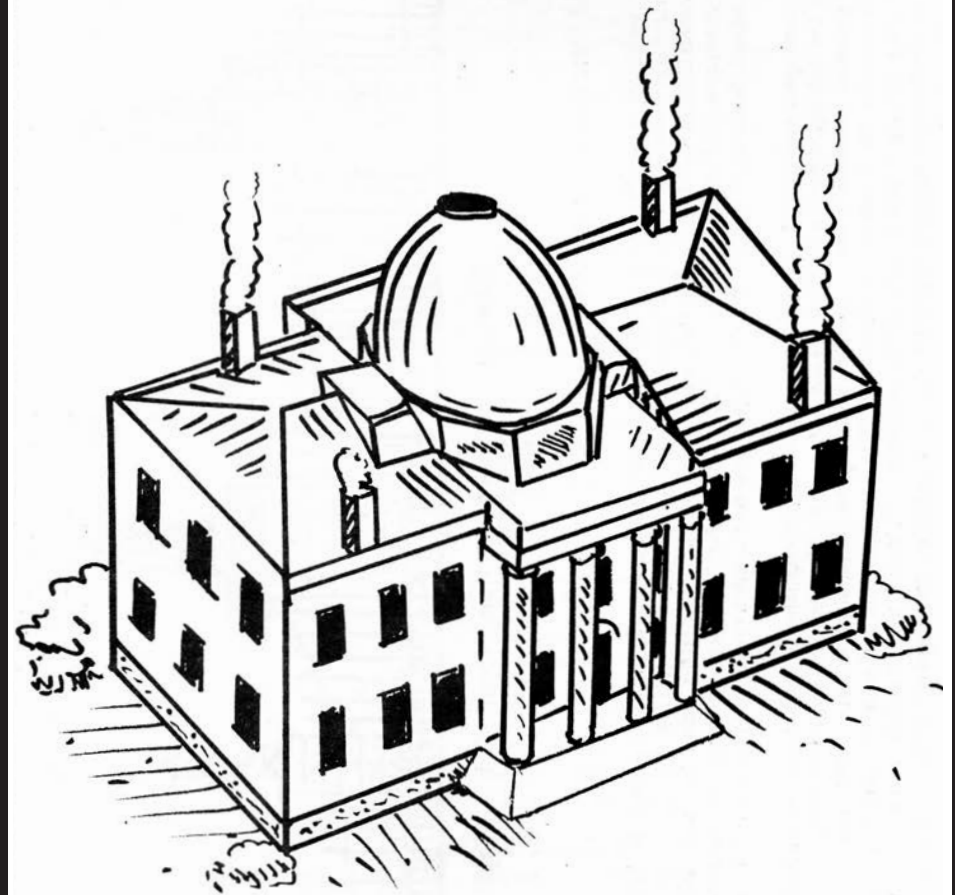




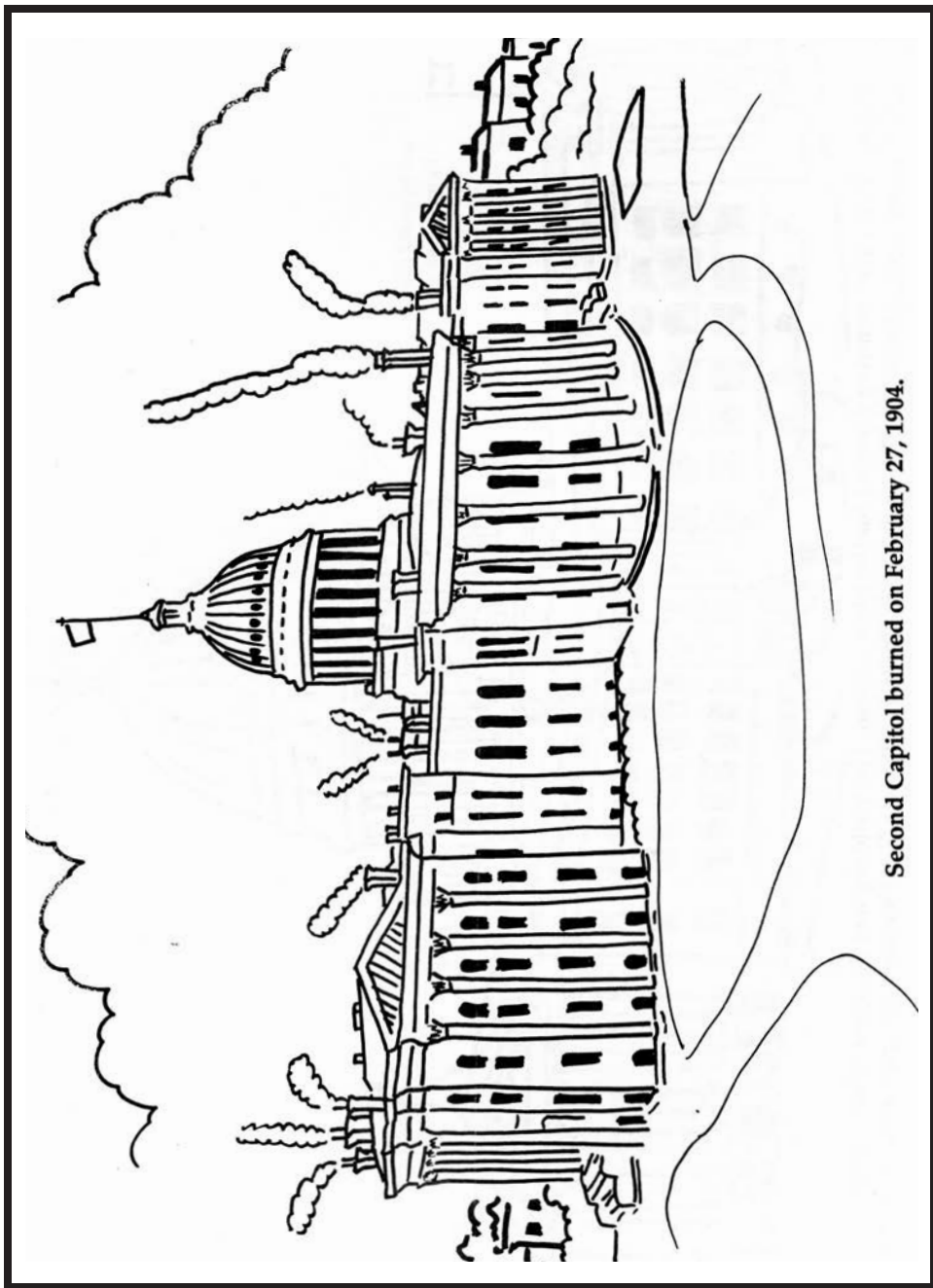
Badger Fire-Hose Holder

Badgers are everywhere at the Wisconsin State Capitol! Each wing of the building once had eight bronze badger fire hoses, 32 in all. Over time, changes in the fire codes led to their removal.

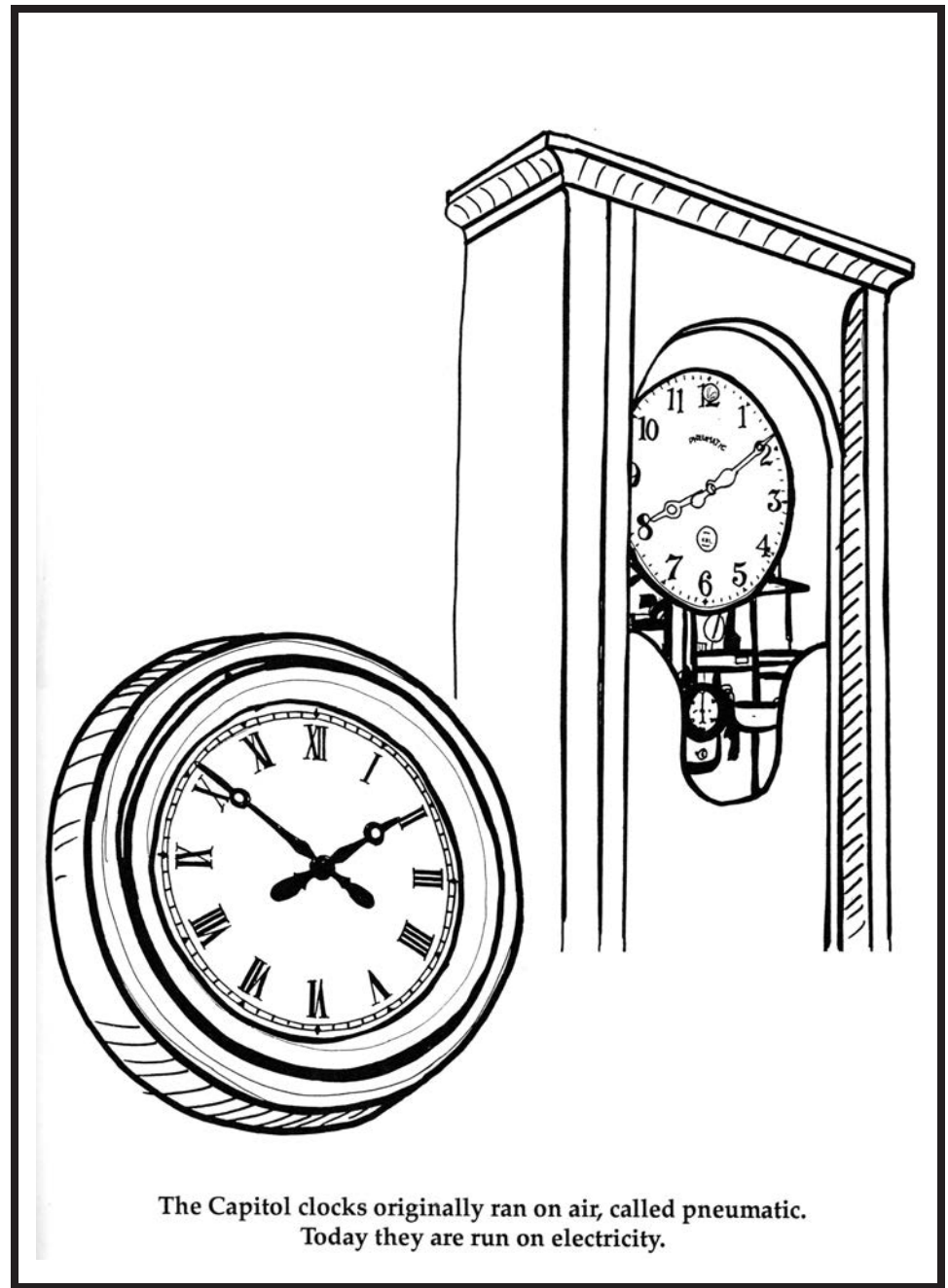
Where else can you find badgers in the Capitol?



First State Capitol in Madison



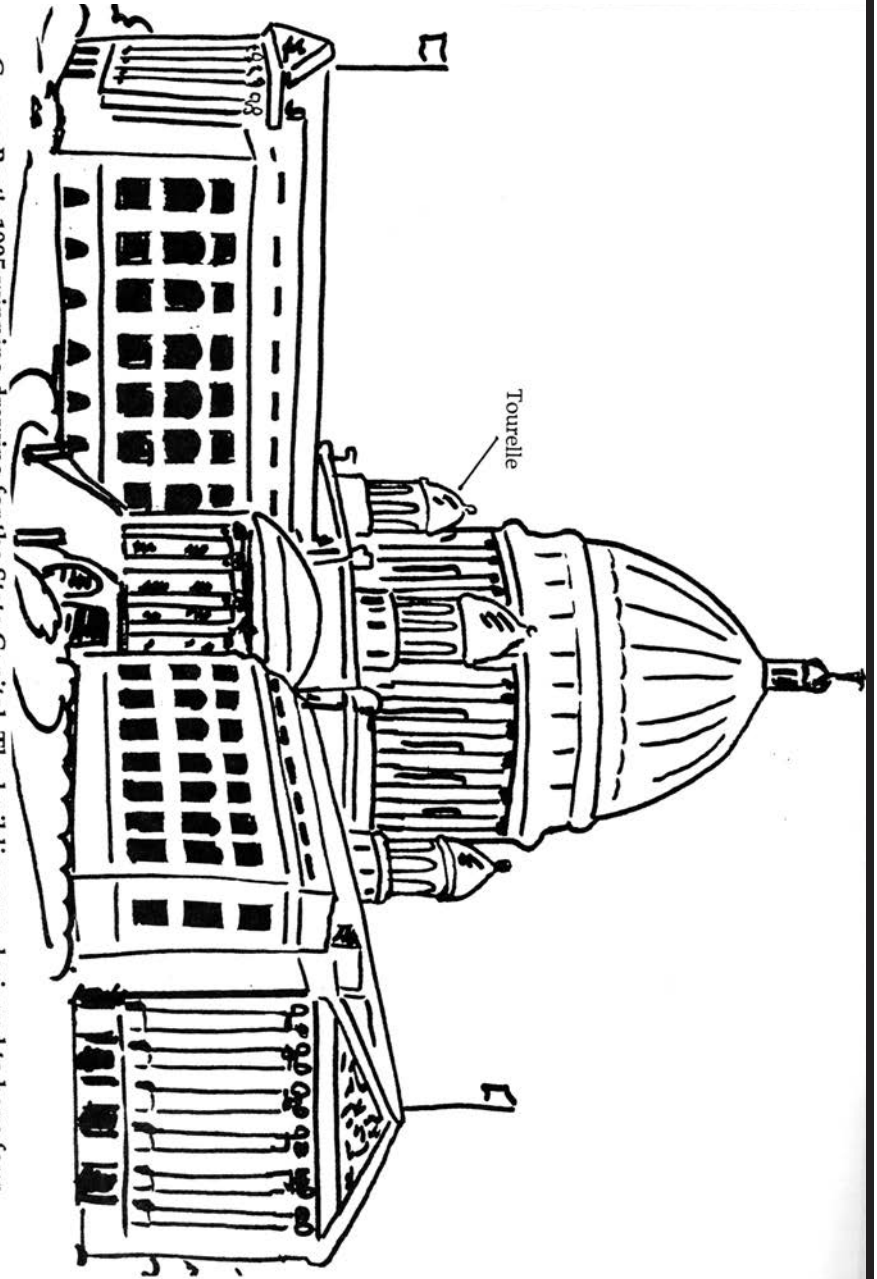
Second Capitol burned on February 27, 1904.



The Capitol clocks originally ran on air, called pneumatic.
Today they are run on electricity.



WISCONSIN is 186" or 15'5" tall, made of bronze and weighs 3 tons.



George Post's 1905 winning drawing for the State Capitol. The building was designed to have four small towers, called tourelles. These were never built, instead the dome statuary groups were added.
